HIGHLIGHTS OF SYNOD 2018

From the Church and Society Committee: <u>Immigration</u>: The Moravian Church should call for the humane treatment of any person coming across our borders, legally or illegally, and to immediately reunite families that have been separated.

Reducing Violence and Promoting Responsible Weapon Ownership

Called on civil authorities to take immediate effective action to reduce violence and the opportunities for violence among the populace and to provide for and fund adequate mental health facilities where those who are judged to be a danger to themselves and/or others may receive prompt care,

Rejected violence as a problem-solving method, and the idea that the only way to reduce violence is with more violence,

Those owning and using weapons for legitimate purposes to act at all times with the highest standards of safety in storage, transport, handling and use of such weapons.

Care and Concern for Women and Girls

Affirmed the dignity and rights of women and girls everywhere; committed to confront and eliminate any means of discrimination against women and girls throughout all of society and directed PEC to

partner with congregations, the Board of World Missions and other relevant entities to continue to offer a ministry of healing and empowerment for women, girls and for those who love them everywhere.

Elimination of Racism:

Institutional, system, and Personal
Reaffirmed "A statement on Racism and the
Church" approved by the 1998 Provincial Synods.
(Available from Pastor Andrews or Pat Jones.)
Required all pastors, licensed ministers and candidates for ordination to receive anti-racism training.

Called upon the PEC to guide all congregations to offer anti-racism training for their members through resources in their communities or resources prepared and/or recommended by the MCNP. Called upon all members to be strengthened by faith in Jesus Christ to overcome fear and become informed about racism and its impact on all human lives; confess the sin of racism; speak and act in love for all people; and work in every aspect of life to eliminate institutional, systemic, and personal racism

Inclusion of Persons of All Gender Identities
Affirmed the dignity and rights of persons of all gender identities; reaffirmed open welcome to all people recognizing that persons of all gender identities are also under God's care and can be members of the church; encouraged pastors and church leaders to engage in training and education related to the understanding of and care for persons of all gender identities.

Awareness of Violence Against Women The PEC will designate one Sunday each year to bring attention to the world-wide problem of violence against women; require continuing education for pastors and directors of Christian Education in identifying signs of abuse and in handling such cases in congregations; educate its congregations and members of their rights under existing legislation; and mandated training in pastoral care including training and regular refresher training to recognize and appropriately address violence against women and children. Promoting Moravian Resources on Social Issues Encouraged the PEC to share in continued dialogue with our ecumenical partners in important issues in our society

A NOTE FROM LISA ANDREWS

Thank you SO much for your prayers and cards and messages this year. I cannot tell you how meaningful and helpful that encouragement has been through good times and difficult times! I miss you all greatly and wish I had the time to come and share with each of you personally, but the following will have to suffice!

I have completed my first full year of seminary. YAY! I still have 2 long years to go, but I have seen God's leading and faithfulness in these first 3 semesters. My course work this year included Theology Survey, Old and New Testament Surveys, Psychopathology, Clinical Counseling Skills, and a class called Group Process to name a few. It has been an especially eye-opening year going deeper into the Bible and really looking at the whole narrative in my Old Testament and New Testament classes. My favorite, although also most difficult, class was Psychopathology. It is such an honor to learn under these professors bring so much wisdom and firsthand experience to their teaching about the variety of mental illnesses.

After being raised Moravian and attending small churches my whole life where I was instantly known as the pastor's daughter.... upon arriving at seminary, I thought to myself "I'd like to have the megachurch experience!" I tried it but after a few months found it did nothing for my heart or my relationship with the Lord. By Christmas 2017 I had begun attending a small Congregational church pastored by an alumna of Gordon Conwell where a few of my classmates attend. Their service begins each week by sharing the joys and concerns of the church and I immediately knew I was home. It's no St. Paul's, but if there's a next best thing - I've found it. I have slowly begun building relationships and making friends and will begin serving in children's ministry this school year. I was voted onto the Student Association and it has been a joy to serve the community, staff, faculty, and other students! I am the Student Association Treasurer for 2018-2019.

Please pray for: sustained energy as the new year begins. As a member of the Student Association I am responsible for shepherding new students into the community, but I am tired. I completed all my

work well this year but have not had adequate time to rest this summer - working as much as possible to save for the school year when I cannot work as often. Please pray for wisdom and discernment, both personally and with my various roles on campus and at church. I am fearing burnout this year. If you would also pray for sustained, lifegiving relationships with the friends I have made both last year and in the coming year. Seminary can be an extremely lonely place with lots of people to talk to, but lacking true connection - not to mention the ordinary distractions of "life" and the stresses and demands of schoolwork, ministry, relationships.
